

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Dear Residents, It is with great sadness that I inform you of the death of long-standing Parish Councillor, Paul Eastham, after a lengthy illness. Amongst other things, Paul was instrumental in obtaining the allotments at St. Oswald's and he was also very much involved with the Church. Paul was a family man and leaves behind his wife, Judith, and his son and family. He will be very much missed by everyone on the Parish Council.



The Village Hall rebuild is now underway and it is hoped that it will be completed by September this year. Look inside for photos!.

The Parish Council has set the budget/precept for next year at £121,900. This represents an increase of £4.50 per household, per year. The base rate for a Band D property will be £47.31 per year. The increase is due to running costs rising. A copy of the budget is below. The cost of rebuilding the Village Hall is being met through CIL funding (Community Infrastructure Levy).

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MAKE A CHANGE!

Are you passionate about your community? Do you want to help make a long lasting change? Do you have innovative ideas for the council? Do you have concerns about a specific issue and want to do something about it?

If this is you, then we need you! We need people from all backgrounds and experiences who reflect their community to put themselves for ward for election. Make a change! Become a Parish Councillor.

Councillors are elected to represent the local community for a period of four years, so you must either live or work in the council area. Becoming a councillor is a rewarding experience, as you will be able to make a change in your community to help improve residents' lives. A councillor's role can include developing strategies and plans for the area, helping with problems and ideas, representing the community, working with other local community groups, decision making and reviewing decisions and talking to the community about their needs and what the council is doing.

Local councils can only be as helpful, connected and energetic as the people elected to run them, so we need councillors capable, enthusiastic and engaged to reflect their communities. You can find out more about becoming a councillor on the Electoral Commission and Local Government Association website. There are three ways that you can become a councillor: standing for election, filling a vacant seat after an election (co-opted) or filling a casual vacancy. Contact the Clerk for more information.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR STANDING

To be able to stand as a candidate at a parish council election you must:

- 1. Be at least 18 years old;
- 2. Be a British citizen, an eligible Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of any member state of the European Union, and meet at least one of the following:
- You are, and will continue to be, registered as a local government elector ٠ for the parish in which you wish to stand from the day of your nomination onwards;
- You have occupied as owner or tenant any land or other premises in the parish area during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election;
- Your main or only place of work during the 12 months prior to the day of your nomination and the day of election has been in the parish area; You have lived in the parish area or within three miles of it during the whole
- of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election.

BECOME A PARISH COUNCILLOR

DISQUALIFICATIONS

Apart from meeting the qualifications for standing for election, there are certain people who are disqualified from being elected to a parish council. You cannot be a candidate at the time of your nomination and on polling day if:

- You are employed by the parish council or hold a paid office under the parish council (including joint boards or committees);
- You are the subject of a bankruptcy restrictions order or interim order;
- You have been sentenced to a term of imprisonment of three months or more (including a suspended sentence), without the option of a fine, during the five years before polling day and the ordinary period allowed for making an appeal or applications in respect of the conviction has passed. A person who is in the process of making an appeal or application in relation to the conviction is not disqualified at any time before the end of the day on which the appeal or application is disposed of, abandoned or fails by reason of non-prosecution.

The full range of disqualifications is complex and if you are in any doubt about whether you are disqualified, you must do everything you can to check that you are not disqualified before submitting your nomination papers. It is a criminal offence to make a false statement on your nomination papers as to your qualification for being elected.

ABOUT LOCAL COUNCILS

A local council is a universal term for community, neighbourhood, parish and town councils. They are the first tier of local government and are statutory bodies. They serve electorates and are independently elected and raise their own precept (a form of council tax). There are 10,000 local councils in England with over 30% of the country parished and 100,000 councillors who serve in these local councils, with over £1b being invested into these communities every year.

Local councils work towards improving community, well-being and providing better services. Their activities fall into three main categories: representing the local community; delivering services to meet local needs; striving to improve quality of life and community well-being.

Through an extensive range of discretionary powers, local councils can provide and maintain a variety of important and visible local services, including allotments, burial grounds, bus shelters, car parks, commons and open spaces, community transport schemes, community safety and crime reduction measures, events and festivals, footpaths, leisure and sports facilities, litter bins, public toilets, planning, street cleaning and lighting, seating, tourism activities, traffic calming measures, village greens and youth projects. However, some of these are more usually provided by District and County Councils.

CHRISTMAS LIGHTS 2022!

The Christmas Lights were extra special last December, thanks to the offer from **PHIL ARMSTRONG of AW FIRE & SAFETY**, Spendmore Lane, to sponsor the lights and help with their installation, together with his co-worker, Kyle, which takes many weeks of preparation before actually putting them all up. COPPULL VILLAGE HALL



Coppull Parish Council purchased the Village Hall in June 1983. It had previously been used as a chapel and was known as Bethshan Chapel.

In later years the hall was used during the day by a play school, run by Mrs Janice Farrimond. Other groups used the hall during the evenings, but it became unfit for purpose as these groups outgrew the premises.



The hall was most recently used primarily by a pre-school, with the Parish Council holding some meetings there and the Coppull Friendship Group, run by Cllr Marjorie Parkinson, holding groups every other week.



THE END OF AN ERA!

You will have noticed if you have travelled down Chapel Lane recently that the old Village Hall has now been demolished. The wooden part of the building was rotting and numerous repairs were not cost effective.

A new hall is being built, which will be a two-storey building, to offer various facilities for the old parish side of the village.





The downstairs will be suitable for a pre-school or similar and the upstairs rooms will be available for community use. There will be a lift to enable disabled access to these rooms.

Builders Dickinson were awarded the contract and pictured on the left is Sue Edwards, Clerk, and her faithful assistant Roxy, the miniature Dachshund, handing over the keys to Kieran Dickinson and his co-worker. The building work should completed by be Sept. 2023.



CHISNALL HALL COLLIERY



Mr Alan Heyes from Chorley has very kindly donated a plaque from Chisnall Hall Colliery to commemorate the Turbine Set, which was started by the wife of Gordon H. Fraser, Managing Director of The Pearson & Knowles Coal & Iron Co. Ltd. on 28 December 1923. The plaque will be put on display in the new Village Hall when it is completed.


Chisnall Hall Colliery was a coal mine in Coppull in Lancashire, England. It was the largest coal mine on the Lancashire Coalfield north of Wigan. The colliery on Coppull Moor

was owned by Pearson and Knowles Coal and Iron Company in 1896 when it employed 135 underground and 48 surface workers. The colliery appeared on maps in 1908 as a coal mine with two shafts and railway sidings connecting its 1.5-mile mineral railway to the London and North Western Railway's West Coast Main Line. In 1930, Pearson & Knowles merged with the Wigan Coal and Iron Company and others and their collieries became the property of the Wigan Coal Corporation. More than 1,000 people were employed there in 1933 and more than 300,000 tonnes of coal were produced annually.

After nationalisation on 1 January 1947, major rebuilding was authorised by the National Coal Board. A new headgear and screens replaced the original structures and a coal washery was added. During the 1950s and early 1960s, more than 1000 men were

employed, producing about 250,000 tons of coal per year.

The colliery closed on 24 March 1967 and was the last pit in the Wigan area apart from small, privately owned mines. The washery and railway remained open for about four months, washing coal brought from Wood Pit, Haydock.

The site was restored by Lancashire County Council between 1981 and 1983 and opened to the public. Little trace of the colliery or its railway survive. The two shafts were not capped and remain open and are partly filled with water. They are surrounded by high, protective brick walls.
